C(2) Service Amenities

Services must be provided on-site except that projects may use off-site services within 1/2 mile of the development (1 1/2 miles for Rural set-aside projects) provided that they have a written agreement with the service provider enabling the development's tenants to use the services free of charge (except for day care and any charges required by law) and that demonstrate that provision of on-site services would be duplicative.

Items 1 through 6 are applicable to Large Family, Senior, and At-Risk projects. **Items 7 through 12** are applicable to Special Needs projects. Items 1 through 12 are mutually exclusive. One proposed service may not receive points under two different categories, except in the case of proportionately-scored services for special needs projects.
